On Covenant and Intimacy

The book of Bereishit or Genesis that we are reading this December, is the story of beginnings. It begins with the story of the heavens and the earth, but it continues with the story of Abraham's family. As we read it week by week, we hear the stories of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob, their wives and their children. I have often wondered: How did we go from telling the story of everything to the story of this little family? An answer that I am beginning to consider is, perhaps the world was created in order to house this little family. Just like each of the first four days of Creation establishes a habitat for the life that will fill it in the coming days, so too the world itself is created in order to prepare a context for a family, namely the family of Israel. This explanation was given by the Sages: "The world was created for the sake of Israel." Now a modern reader immediately finds herself uncomfortable with this answer, 'How could we be so ethnocentric? Every people has felt that way throughout all of history, and they were all wrong. The world has been created for all of us and we need to learn how to share it better.' This is true,

but let's look deeper. What can we learn from this notion that the world was created for Israel? To do that, we have to understand better the idea of Israel.

The very concept of Israel is often unclear. By the way, the term "Israel" as in the sentence "I am an Israel," was how Jews referred to themselves throughout history, before Modernity.² So what does "Israel" mean? The biblical definition doesn't actually help us much here. The story where Jacob's name is changed only says "you have struggled with God and man and overcome." (Genesis 32:28) Defining oneself as "one who struggles" might sound nice (and it is nice if it has to do with the process of continuous, lifelong growth and learning), but it lacks content. In order to understand the concept of Israel we have to look at the covenants that God makes with each of the fathers, Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob. A covenant in the ancient Near East is a treaty. But some of the covenants in Bereishit lack the form of a treaty. The book of Deuteronomy has much more of the form of an ancient vassal-treaty, in which there are mutual obligations between sovereign and recipient of the treaty. The covenants appearing in the book of Genesis look much more like unqualified promises of

relationship. Making an unqualified promise means that God promises all of the benefits regardless of whether or not, we reciprocate and uphold the terms of the Covenant.

Why then does Deuteronomy have such a striking conditionality? The generations following the Babylonian Exile were looking for a reason as to why the Exile had come about, and the If .. then ... clauses of the vassal-treaty promising blessing or curse according to our behavior served their purposes beautifully. However in our time, I think it's important to remember the unqualified nature of the promise of God to Abraham in the "Covenant between the Pieces" (Genesis 15) where God unilaterally makes a covenant promising Abraham and his descendants that Abraham would be fruitful, and inherit the land, and that He would be their God. In Genesis 17, known as the "Covenant of Circumcision" the only thing that God requires of the Jewish people is to circumcise their males, whereas God promises them progeny, protection, and inheritance of the Land of Israel. Covenant is really about relationship. These early covenants are almost exclusively about coming into a relationship with a deity.

God chooses to make that relationship with the most intimate of all human institutions, the family. That's why the rest of the Book of Genesis is the story of a family in relationship to the Creator of heaven and earth. No reason is given for the selection of Abraham. As frequently happens in Torah, we only know the *that* but not the *why*. But do we really know the reasons why those who love us love us? Do they even know? Nevertheless,

Abraham is described later in the Bible as "God's friend" (Isaiah 41:8 and 2 Chronicles 20:7) meaning one who is close to Him, His intimate. Intimacy, and the longing for connection, is why God made a covenant with people at all. This longing for connection is why families come together. We read in the first chapter of Genesis "for this reason a man will leave his father and mother (i.e. his other intimate relationships) and he will cleave to his wife." Because here a person can find that special intimacy that he's looking for. It is more intimate than the relationship with parents. It is a relationship with an equal. It is a relationship with an Ezer Kenegdo, someone who will be a helper, and who will oppose him. This is someone who will provide companionship, someone who is always opposite him or her.

Our longing for intimacy, goes further to explain human life than any other single characteristic. We humans long for intimacy throughout our lives. A baby longs for its mother. A man longs for a woman, and a woman for a man. Throughout all parts of our lives we seek intimacy and we tend to go to the places where we can find it.

Intimacy can also answer our question about the Book of Genesis: Why does the story change from being a story of the Creation of the world to a story of a single family? Because the world was created so that God might have intimacy with human beings. It seems that just as we human build little worlds, namely our homes, little universes of meaning; so too God built the world in order to have a home for himself along with humans. God built a little world just for us to share with

God. Martin Buber's famous monogram I and Thou, explores the kind of relationship that may have motivated God to create everything, the moment of connection when the self and the beloved are not separate, but a single unit, loved and loving, beholding and being beheld, sharing a single thought, and caring for each other implicitly and explicitly. This is very similar to what people mean when they say that what they live for is family and friends. And what motivated God to create everything is also deeply similar. This is the basic insight behind the idea of the Covenant. In the theology of Torah, this is central to understanding anything about human life, our history, and what human nature is like.

As we celebrate Hanukkah this year, let's draw our family close, light the candles, and celebrate these gifts:
Let's celebrate the lives of those with whom we share our life.

Let's celebrate the intimacy that we share. And let's celebrate the Covenant within which we live together, with God and each other.


