



One of the ongoing themes we encounter this week and throughout the desert is the understanding that clothes make the person. We learn about the various commandments given to the Cohanim surrounding their ceremonial garb, especially the High Priest. G-d instructs Moshe to ordain Aaron and his sons by adorning them in the priestly fashion. Afterwards, the Tabernacle is inaugurated and consecrated during a seven-day festival. In my mind, I picture Moshe and Aaron riding high in the finest open chariot, dressed to the nines. They're waving and smiling to all their supporters, as the crowd of Israelites cheer them on. Needless to say, there was a decent amount of pomp and circumstance, as well as ornamental decadence given to these events.

If these fancy and ostentatious marches strike you as outdated, cumbersome, and difficult to imagine, rest assured, we still find new and creative ways to enhance special moments all the time. Often when we read this parsha, I think about the presidential parade that takes place in D.C. on Inauguration Day or the crowning of a new king or queen. Armies still flaunt their achievements in parade style, and some even consider the modern-day wedding ceremony to be the consequential beautification moment for a young couple. In fact, we fashion the outer decoration of our Torah as well as the Torah service procession around the decorative ceremonies of the Cohanim and the Tabernacle, and every day we don a tallis before morning prayers as a means to

connect to the ancient priests who wore the same colorful garments. Dressing up makes us feel something special. We value ourselves differently in a new dress or suit. We hold our heads up a little higher and pump our chests out a little further as we take pride in the fact that we're wearing something new; all the more so when the outfit commemorates or honors a special occasion. So, dust off the formal attire, gala season is in full force this Shabbat. Remember, snazzy attire makes the person and the occasion!

SYNAGOGUE PRESIDENT MARK HOFFMAN

As I write this, less than a week has passed since the most recent attack on a synagogue, this time in Colleyville, Texas. I think we all breathed a sigh of relief when we heard that the hostages had escaped, and perhaps some of us also felt a tinge of pride that they were able to outmaneuver their assailant.

Yet when I think of lessons learned for our own congregation, I realize that, if the assailant's modus operandi had been to inflict immediate death and destruction rather than take hostages, the outcome would likely have been much worse. In the three years since the attack on the Tree of Life synagogue in Pittsburgh, synagogues in this country have enhanced security to the level that already was in place in other parts of the world. Locked doors, security cameras, and armed guards are the norm now. Indeed the doors to the Colleyville synagogue had been locked but were opened for the perpetrator by the goodhearted rabbi who thought he saw a fellow human being in need.

My niece's son, who will have his Bar Mitzvah this Saturday along with his twin sister, heard the news from Colleyville and asked his mother, "We will have security at the service, won't we?" How sad that our children's children grow up in a world

where they have to worry about security for their B'nai Mitzvah.

There is certainly cause for resentment that we have had to become accustomed to planning our escape route every time we walk into a Jewish community building. Yet we can't let ourselves become bitter and turn inward because of the current state of affairs.

In this regard, I am currently learning a new tune for Psalm 30, which is sometimes said at the end of the morning blessings before the start of the Shacharit service. I was struck by the current relevance of these verses:

One may lie down crying at night but wake in the morning with joyful song...
You have turned my mourning into a dance for me.,
You undid my sackcloth and girded me with joy That I might sing of your glory and not be silent.

As I learned from the composer of the new music for this Psalm, the silence is a reference to Aaron, who became silent when he learned that his sons were killed. Though it is a natural reaction to trauma, we must not be indefinitely silenced, but wake in the morning with joyful song.

Hi! My name is Stacey Mandelbaum, and Katie asked me to write something about myself for the bulletin as part of a series to help us get to know one another better, especially during this pandemic. She even gave me some helpful prompts to follow. I usually try to avoid doing things like this—writing about myself—out of a natural reticence, but it's hard to say no to Katie.

My roots are in the New York metropolitan area. I grew up on the north shore of Long Island, and even today most of my family (mother, mother-in-law, all of our siblings, our four children) lives in NYC or the NYC suburbs. My husband, Alex Frank, grew up in Queens, about 20 minutes from where I grew up. We met in New Haven, Connecticut, when I was a medical student and he was a medical resident. We were married in 1986, when I was an OB-GYN resident and he was an internist, and we had our first two children, Emily (1989) and Ariel (1990), in Connecticut. We moved to Queensbury in 1991, when Alex started work as a radiation oncologist at the Glens Falls Hospital Cancer Center. Our son, Ben (1992), and daughter Miriam (1994) were born in Glens Falls.

We joined Congregation Shaaray Tefila soon after we arrived in Glens Falls, because we felt most comfortable in a Conservative congregation. The congregation was very welcoming to us, and we made many wonderful friends at Shaaray Tefila, as well as at Temple Beth El.

Those kind, playful laps helped contain their wiggles through the services.

I also have fond memories of the youth group meetings we used to have in the synagogue social hall, where we played games like Jewish trivial pursuit, baked treats like hamantaschen, latkes and challah, planned for Purim carnivals, created talent shows to perform at local nursing homes, volunteered at a local soup kitchen, and had joint Young Judaea outings and Shabbatons with the Schenectady Young Judaea group.

Alex was on the synagogue board for many years when our children were younger. I joined the board in 2016, when Sunny Buchman asked me to "join for just one year," and most of you know that Sunny never takes no for an answer! Since then, I feel fortunate to work with the committed group of people on the synagogue board. I won't name them all here, but I am grateful to them all. 
