Happy April and Chodesh tov everyone, As we begin the months of April and Nissan, in the midst of our Passover liberation story, let us cautiously look forward to a month of somber remembrance mixed with overwhelming

joy. During the festival of matzah, we commemorate our newfound freedom, liberated from the bondage of Egyptian slavery. Yet, we also need to understand that this new found freedom brings tremendous responsibility, failure, and struggle. Shalom chaverim and hello friends!

For those of you who do not know me, my name is Rabbi Joshua Gray, and I am an independent rabbi who works full-time as a director in the field of mental health. I have grown up in and am a part of the greater Glens Falls community. My home is here. I have put together a class/discussion in what I hope will be offered in 2-3 installations entitled, "Through a Jewish Lens: Mental Health and Wellness". This class will focus on gaining an understanding of mental health as a continuum of wellness, and how this important aspect of oneself is so vital to the wellbeing of a whole person. We will look at some of the facts regarding mental health and wellness in terms of prevalence rates and impact, signs and symptoms that someone is struggling, how to engage in true self-care ("Im ein ani li mi li-If I am not for myself; who will be for me?"- R. Hillel), and how to help someone in need. The class will also tackle the important issue of historical trauma, which is written into the Jewish experience.

This discussion will be given from a uniquely Jewish perspective, combining love of Judaism and Torah with love of our fellow human (is there truly any difference?). We will tackle these issues using Torah, Tanakh, Talmud, Mishnah, the thoughts of great Jewish thinkers and Chazal (our great Sages). I hope you will join me in learning and conversation beginning at 7:00 PM on Thursday, April 19th at Congregation Shaaray Tefila. For those who cannot attend in-person, we will also have a Zoom attendance option. This program is free for all Synagogue and Temple members. I could not be more excited to learn and grow with you!

TEMPLE-SYNAGOGUE RELIGIOUS SCHOOL

Spring is now here and as we get ready to celebrate Passover, we are eager to be

outside, feel the sunshine and enjoy the holiday with our friends and family. We recently celebrated Purim and our fight to stay alive against the evil Haman who wanted our people to disappear. We sang, we read the Story of Esther, we made hamantaschen and we booed Haman louder than ever! If you read this when the newsletter first comes out, we will be close to Passover. Passover is my favorite holiday and so I created a three-part lesson plan for our Religious School students with the hopes of exposing them to the beauty and power of one of our many freedom stories. The strong characters that we see in this story and the challenges that they faced are incredible to us to imagine today. Moses who lead us out of freedom with G-d always by our side and Miriam who protected her baby brother and then lead us in song as we ventured into freedom and others who are named and unnamed in the Torah.

Memories of sitting with my family and singing *Ma Nishtana*, *Dayenu* and *Adir Hu* are held dear in my heart from when I was a child. Exposing our students to the Exodus Story, creating beautiful art and music in honor of our heritage and helping the students to learn how to lead their own *seder*, are my main goals during this time. However, reminding them how lucky we are to be able to live in freedom as a Jewish people and without fear is so important for them to remember at this time as well.

We have exposed our students to *Tikkun Olam* in a unique way this school year by asking them to create both a welcome sign for an Afghani family coming to our area and a banner for the "We Walk for Ukraine" community event. Part of this was artful and fun and the other part is what Tikkun Olam is all about, healing the world and helping those who come to America have the freedom that we are so lucky to have. In addition, supporting the people of Ukraine and their own fight for freedom is so critical for us to be a part of. When a student fully recognizes this as well as has the chance to be creative we have truly been able to meet the goals of Jewish Education. Seeing our students participate in the "We Walk for Ukraine" was such a proud moment for parents and us as educators.

By the end of the year, our students will have gained a new step up in their knowledge of Hebrew, we will

have learned more about, as well as celebrated, Israel during *Yom Ha'atzmaut* by pictures, history, virtual tours, speakers, music and games. We will have completed our multiple step lessons to better understanding and appreciate the *siddur* and we will have taken the time to discover why Jewish literature is important to us! In addition, we will be so excited for Tanis's Bar Mitzvah in August at Temple Beth El and begin preparing for Mattea's in June of 2023. This year has been so unique in that we started the year virtually, came back in pods and finally were able to meet together in one room for group programs in March. We are doing wonderfully and are stronger than ever, and the commitment to Jewish education by our teachers, teen aides and students as always, is in full force. TSRS thanks you so very much for your support and for always remembering that our students are the future of the Jewish world and the gift they give to us as they learn and grow is so very precious.

CLARA RUDNICK

In the February, 2022 bulletin, Katie began a new project to feature one member each month. This month we are featuring Clara Rudnick to celebrate our oldest member who will be 98 in June. Katie and Bonnie spent hours with Clara and her family to bring you her story.



"I was blessed to live here in America and have met so many nice people and have so many wonderful friends in Glens Falls and the surrounding areas." – Clara Rudnick

Clara stated how blessed she was with a wonderful family and special grandchildren (Virginia, Charlie, Ben, and Eli, of blessed memory). She is grateful to have her grandson Charlie (who understands her when she speaks Yiddish to him) here with her for many years.

On June 1, 1924, Caila Charmatz (now Clara Rudnick) was born in Swienciany (Sventzion), Poland (what is now Lithuania), to parents Chiena and Yossel Charmatz. She had an older brother, Itzke, an older sister, Chieh, a twin brother, Avreminkeh, and a younger sister, Verileh. All died in the Holocaust. Before the war, all worked at the family restaurant and bakery in the center of the village. Caila changed her name to Clara when she immigrated to America in 1949.

When Clara was 15 years old, her life changed forever. In July, 1941 Nazi soldiers invaded Sweienciany and abducted her two brothers and other young Jewish boys and shot them in a nearby forest known as Poligon. Their bodies remain there in a long mass burial site along with Clara's mother and sisters, who were also taken away by Nazis and local Lithuanian collaborators who the Nazis used to identify Jews from the Gentiles.

Clara's father saved her by giving her a winter coat and helping her into a backyard steam bath where she hid in its cold oven until the next morning. That escape saved her life. While Clara was hidden in the oven, her father fled to a friend's farmhouse until Clara could meet him there the next day. Father and daughter then hid in other local shtetls including Swir/Svir and Michaliszky which coincidentally was the shtetl of her future husband, Abe (although she would not meet him until 1945). Clara stayed in Swir in the winter of 1941-2 with her father moving

from attics to cellars while searching for food each day. When her father learned that the Nazis were nearby, he and Clara attempted to escape across a frozen lake. While being shot at, he covered her body with his to protect hers from the bullets. Both were captured and placed in the Vilna ghetto where both endured slave labor in various concentration camps for the rest of the war.

Clara and her father were living in the Vilna ghetto and enduring slave labor there until 1943, when the Nazis began to send thousands of Jews to Ponary, a killing field outside of Vilna where her future husband Abe's family was killed. Other Jews were liquidated from the Vilna ghetto, when her father was sent to a slave labor camp in Estonia. Clara was then captured again and taken to the Gestapo in Kalich, where she was forced into slave labor sewing fur coats by hand for the Nazis. She was then transferred to a concentration camp in Kaiserwald that made her use her bare hands to pour acid into cases to make batteries for the Nazi war effort. Clara felt lucky to be alive but knew that they could kill her at any point or she could have a fatal accident with the dangerous acid. She was then placed on a cattle train for Stutthoff, a concentration camp on the Baltic Sea in Poland. Clara survived while 85,000 others died there. Clara's life was saved again when she was sent to a farm to work while 5,000 other prisoners were marched to their death and forced into the Baltic Sea and machine gunned. Presumably one of them, her father. Before he died, she was able to see him one last time through a chain link fence. On March 11, 1945, she was liberated by the Russian Army.

Not knowing where to go, Clara traveled with some fellow women camp survivors to Lodz, Poland. When Clara reached Lodz, she spent the first week living under a bombed-out staircase and bargained for food from local Polish street merchants. Lodz was a city near Auschwitz and became a gathering place for survivors to place their name on a wall to find their families. Clara didn't find any of her family or relatives, but instead met her future husband Abraham (Abe) Rudnick.

They were married in November, 1945 and lived in Foehrenwald, a Jewish Displaced Persons' camp in Bavaria. They were brought to America on the USS Howser, the thirteenth ship authorized by Congress per the Displaced Persons' Act of 1948.

On September 9, 1926, Abe was born to Chaia and Mendel Rudnick in Michaliszki, a small village on the Polish-Lithuania border. In 1941, at age 15, he was captured by Nazis and sent to the Vilna Ghetto

in Lithuania and to various slave labor camps in Estonia, Poland and Germany for the remainder of WWII. In April, 1945, he was nearing death when he was liberated by US Forces from the Dachau concentration camp near Munich, Germany. Treated in an American hospital converted from an ancient castle, Abe recovered and began to search for his missing parents, brother and other family members in Lodz. He learned that all were killed during the war. During his search, he met Clara.

They married eight months after they were liberated. In 1947 while in the Foerenwald's Displaced Persons' Camp, she bore twin sons, Marvin and Joseph. While in the Bavarian camp, two Yiddish-speaking Jewish-American soldiers helped to find Abe's uncle so they could come to the United States. They emigrated to Troy, New York on May 18, 1949.

Clara and Abe moved to Glens Falls in 1952 where their third son, Howard was born. Soon after, they joined Congregation Shaaray Tefila where their twins attended Sunday School. Her three sons became a Bar Mitzvah at Shaaray Tefila; Joe and Marvin in 1960 and Howard in 1967.

Clara, a housewife raising three boys, also worked at the synagogue BINGO for over 20 years. She worked with Claire and Burt Kantrowitz, Ann Meyer (who lived in Corinth) and many more. For ten years, Clara used to plant beautiful flowers in front of Shaaray Tefila.

Clara went to Israel for a gathering of the 50th Celebration of Holocaust Survivors in 1995. Father Michael Abraham read about her in the newspaper and contacted Clara. He was a substitute teacher in Warrensburg and asked her to share her story with the school children. Also, teacher Jack Hellman invited Clara to share her story with many classes and other educators. She then was invited to many other school districts in the North Country area. Sharing her story was vital for Clara so future generations will not forget the atrocities of that time in history. She received hundreds of letters and cards from students and educators throughout the North Country which she donated to Crandall Library.

Clara and Abe loved their many visits to the National Yiddish Book Center in Amherst, MA.

The Rudnicks founded the Eli Rudnick Holocaust Memorial Library at Sharaay Tefila in memory of their grandson who died in an accident in 1998.

Sadly, Abe passed away following a long illness on February 3, 2012. For fifty years, Abe had owned Save-On Plumbing and Heating Company on Upper

Glen Street. During those years, he built the nearby Queensbury Gardens Apartments on Rudley Drive. Abe was one of the early developers of Upper Glen Street in Queensbury.

In 2013, Clara returned to her hometown, Swienciany to visit the mass gravesite of her family. Her son Marvin stated that when they located the killing field (mass gravesite), his mother instantly screamed out, "Verileh!," her younger sister's name.

There were no Jews left in her hometown. Before the war, there were 100 synagogues in Vilna, which is near her hometown of Swienciany. Clara went to a Friday evening (Shabbat) service at the one remaining Shul (synagogue), the Choral Synagogue of Vilna.

This was an extremely emotional trip for Clara. Soon after, special family friends presented Clara with a cherished book of photos taken on that trip.

Clara always commemorates March 11, in memory of Holocaust survivors and Clara attends and/or participates in Holocaust Remembrance Day (Yom HaShoah). She was one of the speakers in 2018 at the Broad Street American Legion where they honored local Holocaust, World War II and other war survivors.

Clara is an amazing survivor who is proud of her sons: Joseph, a doctor; Marvin, a lawyer; and Howard who works with the sick and elderly. She is also proud of her grandchildren's career paths. Clara loves to listen to Yiddish music and has beautiful gardens of flower varieties in the spring, fall and summer. She has a gifted green thumb.

Clara always looks forward to seeing and talking with her special family and many wonderful friends in Glens Falls, surrounding areas, many states and countries. Katie enjoyed meeting Clara in-person for the first time. Bonnie and Katie were honored to spend time with Clara and her family to compose this article.


