RABBINIC INTERN DAVID MAGAZINE MALMUD

I am thrilled to introduce myself to this amazing community. I am eager to join you all at Shaaray Tefila this month and share some words of Torah with each other. I am a Marylander, born and raised in the DC suburbs. I grew up at a beautiful and passionate Reconstructionist shul. While I have since drifted away from the Reconstructionist movement, I am eager to participate in and lead similarly spirited community and prayer spaces.

I am writing this prior to Shabbat Eikev in the final book of Devarim. While reading through this rich parshah over my morning coffee, I stumbled on a verse that really spoke to me:

Know with your heart that just as a man disciplines his son, Hashem your G-d disciplines you. אוֹדְעָתָּ עִם־לְבָבֶךְ כִּי כָּאֲשֶׁר יְיִפֶּר אִישׁ אֶת־בְּנוֹ יְהוָה אֱלְהֶיךְ מִיִּפְּרָהְ - - וְיִדעָתָּ עִם־לְבָבֵךְ כִּי כָּאֲשֶׁר יְיִפֶּר אִישׁ אֶת־בְּנוֹ יְהוָה אֱלֹהֶיךְ מִיִּפְּרָ - Devarim 8:5

This language of the divine father as a disciplinarian can seem harsh. Growing up Reconstructionist, I actively struggled with the imagery of the divine father, which shows up throughout our liturgy, but particularly during the High Holidays (see, for instance Avinu Malkenu). Even after no longer identifying as Reconstructionist, I wrestled with this notion, particularly after hearing from folks who had less than ideal relationships with their fathers. With the High Holidays on the horizon, however, this recurring theme from this week's parshah jumped out at me.

A little over a year ago, my perspective shifted on the divine father metaphor. My wife, Rebecca, gave birth to twins last summer and I started to understand the notion of G-d as father. Having sons of my own, I finally understood the father/son relationship from the other perspective. As a father, I feel a mix of deep love, pride, compassion, and joy for my boys, Ben and Ari.

This does not erase the fact that many fathers act harshly towards their children.

יסר in this form means discipline, but in a different form, מוּסֵר, of the same root, יסר, means to teach wisdom. Musar literature is a whole genre of early modern ethics literature, not at all about harsh discipline. Personally, I prefer this reading of the verse. Either way, the different forms of the same word reflect the variety in fathers and parenting styles. This root, יסר, and the verse in general also demonstrate the multiple relationships an individual can have with their father and simultaneously the multiple relationships an individual has with the divine. Sometimes, our relationship may feel warm and loving, and other times it may feel cold and distant. No matter how we interpret it, the metaphor of the divine father is a fixture of High Holidays of this penitential season.

Over the following weeks leading up to the High Holidays, I encourage us all to explore this and other features of the High Holiday liturgy. Try it on for size. Maybe it works for you, maybe it doesn't. I invite you to choose any prayer, a piyyut, or some of the Torah portions. There are some challenging themes that I hope we can all wrestle with together.

OUR GREAT BIG IRISH BAR MITZVAH

Early in July, I had the pleasure, thrill, and honor of attending and participating in my grandson, Elijah's Bar Mitzvah. My son, Adam, his wife, Tara, and Eli moved to Ireland, 40 minutes from Dublin, when Elijah was about to go into first grade. They wanted a two or three-year adventure in an English-speaking country and they're still there eight years later.

There is only one synagogue in Dublin, the Dublin Jewish Progressive Congregation and it seemed that Hebrew School was going to be unlikely there. One of our very own came to the rescue, Rebecca Charhon who for several years provided virtual Hebrew School for Eli. He loved working with her and he loved learning to read Hebrew and learning more about Jewish rituals, prayers, and history. When it got closer, Rebecca began Bar Mitzvah lessons which were taken over by Rabbi Jackie Tabick from London for the last five weeks. Unlike at Shaaray Tefila where we have access to student rabbis, there are no rabbinic seminaries in Ireland. Consequently, this lovely, small synagogue conducts mostly lay services but enlists one of four retired rabbis who come from London for holidays and special events. Along with periodic communication with Rebecca, Rabbi Jackie worked with Eli every day except Saturday, an hour a day for five weeks to prepare him to read the Torah portion and Haftorah, both in Hebrew with trope, and in English.

So, the Bar Mitzvah. It actually began before the eventful day on Friday morning, July 5, with a four -hour walking tour of Dublin, incorporating Jewish sites and led by a synagogue member, a convert to Judaism and a native of Ireland. It ended with a brief visit to a small Jewish museum in the formerly Jewish neighborhood of Portobello where I first met 77-year old Hilary, director of the museum and, as I would learn, director of many things. Above the one room museum was a lovely one-room synagogue, a "shteebl," no longer in use but the torahs and other artifacts were on display. It reminded me of some of the one-room synagogues, storefronts and basement shuls that I knew as a child in the South Bronx.

After this it was a rush back to the AirBnB house I had rented in a beautiful neighborhood of classic homes, Rathgar, where all the homes had the well-known "Dublin doors." Most Jews live in Rathgar

and some in nearby Rathmine where the synagogue is located. While estimates vary, there are fewer than 3000 Jews in the entire Republic of Ireland.

At the house, we had a huge buffet dinner, paper plates, self-serve, messy and fun, catered by Chabad. There is a Chabad house in Dublin but rather than take Jews away from this one synagogue, the Chabad rabbi decided to open a glatt kosher grocery store/restaurant with catering. So in Ireland, we had mountains of glatt kosher shnitzl, goulash, hummus, babaganoush, latkes, fried gefilte fish (Fried? Is that the Irish way?) and a dozen other dishes. After that, off to the synagogue two blocks away for a Bar Mitzvah rehearsal orchestrated by none other than Hilary. Eli had practice with the rabbi's "pinching" clues when he had to read more slowly or more loudly. Family and friends did our practice aliyahs, arc opening and closing and dressing the torah. I have four children and never had a Bar/Bat Mitzvah rehearsal. Who knew?

Saturday morning was the Bar Mitzvah service and Eli did beautifully thanks to Rebecca's wonderful instruction and Rabbi Jackie's final weeks of tutoring and yes, Hilary's direction throughout. The sanctuary was vibrant with red, white and blue yarmulkes/kippot (Eli's nod to the US) that I had crocheted. They were on the heads of Jews, Irish Catholics and on the head of Adam's close friend since kindergarten, a Muslim. I also loved that Rabbi Jackie insisted on an English recitation as well as a Hebrew one and further, that Eli explained what it meant to him. Eli is very proud of his Judaism, surprising especially since he's the only Jewish child in his school and neighborhood.

Following the service, there were more mountains of food for the kiddush catered again by Chabad and supervised by Hilary. Then a celebration in the evening at a club in a nearby hotel. Most of the guests were Irish, most not Jewish but all celebrated, attempted the Hora dance, sang to karaoke, were joyous, drank heartily and had a good time. Interesting too was that most of the Irish guests gave Eli money gifts in multiples of eighteen. How did they know about Chai? Well, the internet of course but so nice that they cared to research it.

However, there was an unhappy event earlier in the day when we were leaving the shul. Several of us gathered to take pictures in the lovely courtyard in front of the building. The president came out and told us to go back inside for pictures as it was too

dangerous for groups of Jews to be congregating publicly. The entire property is enclosed by a tall, iron gate with a full-time security guard who monitors its opening and closing and questions all before they can enter. That was very sad. The Chabad restaurant had also lost many of their non-Jewish customers since October 7.

Since so many people had flown in from everywhere, there was a brunch on Sunday morning at the Chabad restaurant. I chose not to go but went to the Jewish Museum instead, the only day it was open to the public except by appointment—security there also and several synagogue members in attendance. It was very interesting, although heartbreaking as it brought into focus how the number of Jews in Dublin had diminished over the years. I spent hours with Hilary, yes, the director, hearing her descriptions of artifacts and details of her own four-generation family history in Dublin. The day ended with a rock concert (Do they still call it that?) with some contemporary group that we oldies didn't know.

The festivities went on for three days, at all times understated, not ostentatious and most importantly, joyous and celebratory. I was so proud of my grandson and proud of my son and daughter-in-law for everything over the years that went into this beautiful event happening and of course, for giving me the most amazing grandson. I wish my parents, Holocaust survivors had known him, been present and shared in the "naches" (joy). Eli was incredible, sincere and proud of his faith and heritage. My son was his exuberant, joyous self but more so, was my daughter in-law. I am grateful to Rebecca and Rabbi Jackie. I bonded with Hilary and hope to maintain a relationship with her and to continue to hear news of the Dublin Jewish Progressive Congregation through their newsletter which, by the way, Hilary also writes.


